Homework: Worksheet – Using the Discriminant

Essential Question: How do you use the discriminant to determine the number and type of solutions?

Previously we've used factoring to solve quadratics of the form $ax^2+bx+c=0$. Solving

quadratic equations we found different types of solutions. Is there a method to tell what kinds of solutions we will have with certain quadratic equations. The discriminant:

The discriminant determines the number and type of solutions without solving.

If the discriminant is positive	If the discriminant is equal to	If the discriminant is negative
the graph has two real	zero the quadratic has one	the quadratic has two complex
solutions	(repeated) real solution	(imaginary) solutions
$b^2 - 4ac > 0$	$b^2 - 4ac = 0$	$b^2 - 4ac < 0$
2 real solutions	1 real solution	2 complex/imaginary (no real solutions)
2 x-intercepts	1 x-intercept	No x-intercepts
